Background/Importance

• **Disabling** equipment or machinery

- Isolating it from energy sources
- Securing it with locks and tags
- Communicating clearly about the work being done

#### **Hazards and Common Issues**

Construction sites are full of potential energy hazards—electrical, hydraulic, mechanical and more. Without proper LOTO procedures, workers are exposed to the following risks:

Lockout/Tagout (LOTO) is a safety procedure to help ensure that dangerous machines and energy sources are properly shut off and not restarted before

- Electric shock
- Burns
- Crushing injuries
- Unexpected equipment startup

LOTO procedures help **prevent accidental energization** and protect workers from hazardous energy releases.

#### **Safety Controls**

**Types of Energy Sources on Site** 

- Kinetic: Electrical, thermal, radiant, sound, hydraulic
- **Potential:** Chemical, suspended loads, pressurized systems, magnetic, mechanical

#### Implementing LOTO on Site

- 1. Risk Assessment
  - Identify all energy sources.
  - Develop isolation procedures for each source.
- 2. Use of Isolating Devices
  - Examples include circuit breakers, disconnect switches and line valves.
- 3. Group Lockout
  - Coordinate when multiple trades are involved.
  - Use group lock boxes and maintain clear communication.

#### **Training and Awareness**

- Include LOTO procedures in **new hire orientation**.
- Conduct regular refresher training.
- Reinforce awareness through signage and safety meetings.
- Ensure all personnel understand OSHA requirements and site-specific procedures.
